Dr Lee Pachonick, Di Santoro and Debbie Cook continue to run our monthly sterilisation programme efficiently and effortlessly. We are also very grateful to these wonderful ladies for their time and expertise.

We are extremely thankful to our many sponsors and supporters, and the donations we continue to receive from the members of the public which enable the team to do such a wonderful job.

We look forward to yet another successful year and feel confident that our team will tackle any and all obstacles in their way, as they have so successfully done in the past.

# Dog School Manager's Report

## Overview

Although Funda Nenja has evolved enormously since its early beginnings in 2009, the dog school remains as the heart of our organisation, as well as being our portal into the broader community. Our dog school is where the values of kindness, respect, compassion and responsibility are nurtured through the weekly dog training classes and our One Welfare approach fosters social change. The dog school is also one of the few extra-mural activities available to the community's youth, providing a safe space for social interaction, in addition to receiving humane education and acquiring life skills. These lessons learnt at Funda Nenja help young people have healthier relationships with their families, friends, teachers, neighbours and all that enter their lives.

## The Dog Training Programme:

We held 37 dog school sessions this past year with a total of 103 new learners joining the program over 10 new monthly intakes, and an average total of 48 handlers and dogs at our Friday afternoon sessions. This is a decrease in numbers compared to previous years, but several factors influenced this change.

Firstly, in February 2023, we introduced a policy requiring new learners having to present signed and completed forms on registration in an effort to reduce the high drop- out rate. This step proved to be successful in this respect. Secondly, adverse weather conditions and the move to a new venue on the other side of the township also played a part in the diminishing numbers. Thirdly, as dog owners can now readily access clinic services without first enrolling in the dog school, some see no need to join the weekly classes. We are confident that our numbers will pick up once we are fully established in our new venue at Mpophomeni Sports Stadium.

Most of our learners are boys with an average age of 12 years although some were much younger and some a whole lot older. We are seeing a slight increase in the number of young girls bringing their dogs to dog school with an average of 7 each week being recorded.





## One Welfare

Thanks to the continued monthly donation of dog food by the Do- More Foundation, RCL Foods and the Gabrielle Faickney Charitable Trust, we are still able to provide each learner with a small portion of dog food to take home on a weekly basis, as well as the essential dog training treats used in class. Funda Nenja believes that the welfare of the children attending the dog school programme goes hand in hand with the welfare of the dogs, so every child attending the classes on Friday afternoons is given a juice and a piece of fruit each week, thanks to the ongoing sponsorship of 2 local Spar supermarkets.

Our annual winter warmth drive saw the dog school learners, as well as some of their needy family members, being gifted with blankets and beanies. The dogs all received a new blanket and a dog jacket to ward off the winter chills.

At the end of the school year the dog school participants were each treated to a gift bag filled with treats for both themselves and their dogs thanks to the support of kind local donors.



## Volunteers and Community Assistants

Volunteers and community assistants are an essential part of the dog school and we had an average of 25 helpers, in addition to our 6 staff members, assisting at our Friday afternoon training sessions.

The team members assist with distribution of juice, fruit and dog food to the children, sales of collars, leads, dog food and kennels, preparing treat bags for our handlers, primary veterinary care, stock control, and class instruction. Our community assistants are from the local community of Mpophomeni, while volunteers come from the surrounding areas of Hilton and Howick. Our Community Assistants all receive a monthly stipend in appreciation of their commitment and contribution to the initiative.

One of the highlights of the year was the visit in July by the Battersea grants and academy teams who spent 2 days with us getting a real-life experience of both the dog school and the outreach program. Their feedback was very positive and we were thrilled when they subsequently granted us substantial funding which will allow us to both sustain and improve our services to the Mpophomeni community.

In the latter part of 2023, Bongani Makhathini, who was our Animal Welfare Education Officer intern, gave notice as he was offered a tertiary study scholarship. We identified Vuyo Lokani, a long- time community assistant, and offered him the position and were delighted when he commenced duties in January 2024

An end of year function for the dog school team was held at the Mpophomeni Tourism Centre in December. Each team member was given a small gift in appreciation of services given to our organisation. At the end of 2023, Funda Nenja relocated to the Mpophomeni Sports Stadium which entailed a huge amount of logistical planning and a large effort on everyone's part. This new venue offers Funda Nenja a more secure tenure and the ability to service a different sector of the community.

In February 2024, we invited 5 handlers from the top class to join the dog school as intern instructors to ensure we have sufficient trainers at hand should we lose some of the more senior members when study or work opportunities present themselves.

## Education and Skills Development

The up-skilling and development of our community assistants continues to be a priority and we take every opportunity to do so. This past year our social worker has given a life skills presentation to the team members and in October, Dream Centre from Love Howick, gave an excellent work ethics workshop which was enjoyed by all.



The Project Administrator, Social Worker and myself attended the Midlands NPO Forum meetings in September and November which were excellent networking opportunities as well as being informative.

## Conclusion

Funda Nenja aims to not only impart knowledge, but to facilitate social change through our outreach work. The dogs attending our venue on Friday afternoons are mostly in very good condition and the handling skills of the majority of the people using our services indicate that the past 15 years of our presence in Mpophomeni has had a very positive impact on this community.

The Dog School team continues to strive to improve all facets of the Friday afternoon programme and remains both flexible and adaptable to the constant challenges that present themselves. We remain committed to our vision and are most thankful to the support of all those who contribute to the success of this vital element of the Funda Nenja initiative.

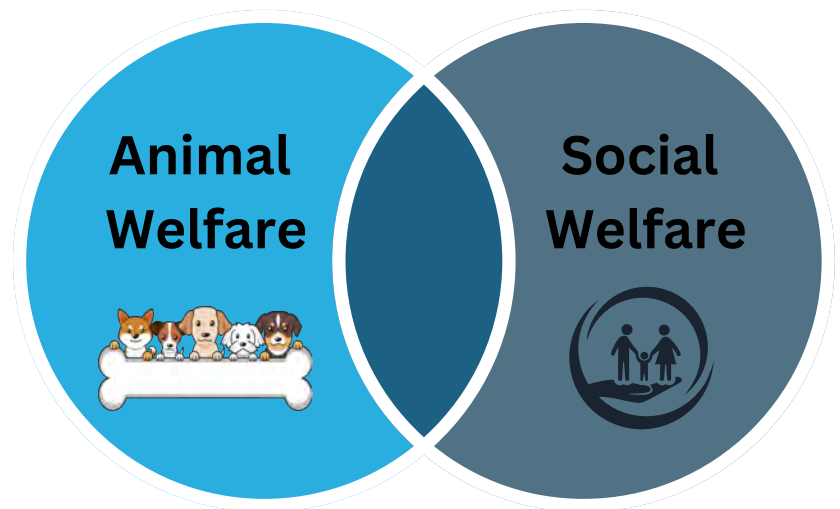
## Project Administrator's Report

We have seen wonderful support from the community and are happy to see how our staff are welcomed and appreciated during our outreach work. The community show their gratitude and appreciation for the work that we are doing, in both the animal and social welfare aspects of the programme. .

Societal change occurs with a holistic approach that includes:

- working WITH the community
- Changing behaviours by building relationships
- Recognising the interrelation between animal and human welfare

## Administration & Funding

In order to comply with relevant authorities and donors Funda Nenja policies and procedures are reviewed annually. Although the organisation is still relatively small in comparison with most NPO's, we take the guidance of the King III report on governance seriously and are attempting to implement relevant policies in decision making and in financial management. Donor funds are utilised according to the terms and conditions set out in contracts.

Staff and volunteer suitability is reviewed and parent indemnity is secured.

We are very grateful for the support received from both local and international donors. Without their support, Funda Nenja would not be able to continue the work that we do. For this, we are extremely grateful. As we came to the end of a 5 year funding period with Dogs Trust Worldwide, we are excited and grateful to be entering into a new relationship with Battersea, in the UK. We look forward to working together with them in the new year, and seeing Funda Nenja reach new goals and expectations.



## Community Outreach:

### Animal Welfare:

Our community outreach program has proven extremely beneficial in ascertaining problem areas that Funda Nenja needs to focus more on. In order to do this, our Animal Welfare Education Officer, Nomonde Dlungwane, continues to conduct home visits for all the Funda Nenja participants, where she monitors and educates families on how to take care of their dogs, as well as educating them in areas of concern.





## Report by Nomonde Dlungwane - Animal Welfare Education Officer:

2024 has been an exceptional year and despite its challenges we continued to help owners and animals in need. Animal welfare education serves as guidance on how to take care of dogs in a humane way and meet their basic needs. I have continued to conduct home visits for all Funda Nenja participants, members of the community, as well as Funda Nenja staff. By conducting home visits, we are placing time and effort into transforming the animal's environment by educating the owners on sustainable solutions. By providing education and solutions to the owners we are also helping to enhance the bond between owners and their pets. On these home visits, I monitor and educate families and check on the following:

- Getting dogs off short chains
- That adequate shelter is available
- Clean water availability on a daily basis
- Food availability on a daily basis
- Importance of sterilization
- Contacting the SPCA for dogs who are sick or injured
- Educating owners on how to be responsible pet owners
- Providing a clean environment/area where the dog lives



### Intake:

On the first Friday of the each month we have new and old children coming into the programme and on this day we take down their details so we can do a home visit. The children are separated into 3 classes, their dogs are vaccinated and they are issued with educational material.

### Home visits:

The aim is to teach the community about the importance and necessity of basic animal welfare. We strive to improve animal welfare and to prevent animal suffering by responding to assist animals in need. Our home visits are focused on working with the owners through monitoring and providing professional services. A regular presence by doing follow up visits delivers the most effective results in the development of knowledge and animal care awareness. This year we conducted a total 825 home visits including the new intake, children who have been in the programme for some time and the community.

On home visits we also assist with the following:

- Rabies vaccinations
- De-worming
- Treatment for ticks and flea
- Treat minor cuts and injuries
- Education on the animal welfare - 5 freedoms



We have continued to assist the community and have donated kennels to Funda Nenja children who are worthy candidates. This programme has been a success because we are making a difference and improving the quality of life of the Mpophomeni dogs. This is all possible because of all the people who are willing to donate their old kennels or people who want to sponsor worthy candidates.

**Fencing programme:**

Most people cannot afford to fence their property properly and this results in them chaining their dogs for different reasons to keep them safe. We have continued to identify deserving recipients for the fencing programme. We fence off an area where the dogs can enjoy their freedom and not be chained.



**Outreach programmes:**

In the past years we have gotten a lot of people from outside of Mpophomeni wanting us to come to their communities to assist them and bit by bit we are trying to reach the outlying areas. We do hold regular Rabies vaccination clinics in the outlying areas. Our community outreach programme has made a huge difference to the dogs in the communities as we continue to provide guidance to the families. In areas where there are no welfare organizations or veterinary services, Outreach programmes play a vital role. Educational resources and outreach programmes help promote understanding of empathy for animals.

**Safety lessons and holiday workshops:**

Theory lessons for the 3 new intake classes have been held monthly along with holiday workshops to teach children to be responsible dog owners. Some of the topics I have covered are:

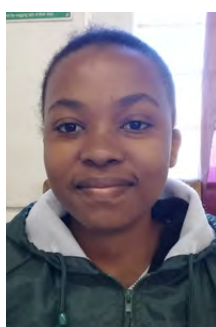
- The basic 5 freedoms
- Safety around dogs
- Understanding dogs body language
- Importance of vaccines (rabies and 5 In 1)
- Importance of sterilizations - Understanding the critical core of sterilization in reducing animal suffering and homelessness
- Pit bulls awareness
- How to be a responsible dog owner



**School lessons:**

We were given the opportunity to hold lessons at the Sifisesihle Primary School and the Nxamalala Islamic School. We are looking forward to continue working these schools and others to provide education, as education is the key to change.

We are grateful for the support, which is critical in enabling us to make a positive impact.

## Veterinary Services:

We are extremely fortunate and grateful to have Dr Daniela Steckler (Hughes) as one of our very dedicated volunteers. Dr Dannie has continued to run our Friday afternoon veterinary clinics. She treats any minor medical issues as well as doing rabies vaccinations, tick & flea control, de-worming, 5-in-1 vaccinations etc, for any dogs from the community as well as the Funda Nenja dogs. For any major medical issues, the dogs are either treated by the Midlands Veterinary Hospital or the uMngeni SPCA.



Dr Lee Pachonick, our veterinarian in charge of our sterilisations has continued to run our monthly clinics. Thanks to Dogs Trust Worldwide, we were fortunate to once again receive funding for our monthly sterilisation programme. Dr Lee, and her wonderful team of volunteers, Di Santoro and Debbie Cook, run these steri clinics like a well-oiled machine. Their professionalism and caring nature ensures that the dogs are all well taken care of and discharged once they have recovered sufficiently. Each dog is driven home at the end of the day, with a bag of dog food, by our driver.

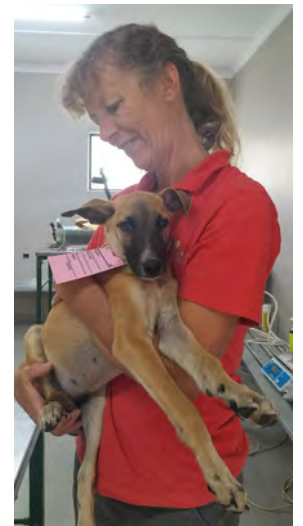

## Social Welfare:

Our Aux. Social Worker, Zinhle Msimango, has continued to work with the community in several ways. She has a very challenging job dealing with a variety of physical, psychological and emotional issues, nevertheless, she has made a huge difference to the wellbeing of the those community members that she has engaged with.

### Report by Zinhle Msimango - Social Worker:

#### Social Services offered:

- Home Visits
- Counselling
- Friday dog school lessons
- School Lessons
- Workshops & Holiday Clubs
- Support groups
- Food parcels

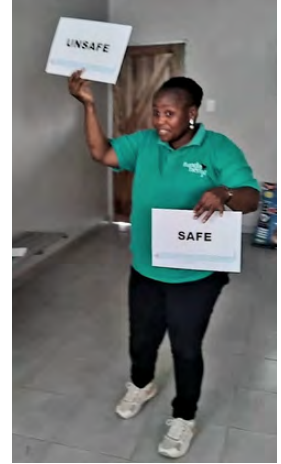
**Home Visits** have given us the opportunity to know and understand the children better, knowing their background, the environment they are growing up in, which affects the children's way of living, and to meet their parents. The visits are done as soon as possible after the intake week to introduce the Funda Nenja services and do assessments with families. On home visits we've gathered and evaluated the information of the families and the individuals within those homes we visit and parents or guardians get to sign Funda Nenja consent forms. With this we are able to intervene and assist with the problems faced by both parents and children which can also affect the life of animals that we trying to protect.

The opportunity of visiting families has made it possible to deliver services and give proper advice to the community and we have provided psychosocial support to Funda Nenja's families, focusing on social, emotional, cognitive, educational and health issues in creating a better way of living and referrals were done to advanced resources. During this period, there were 389 home visits conducted, including the follow up home visits as required. Through donations received, Funda Nenja has provided food donations, school uniforms, clothes, shoes and household items, in support of the needy community and are distributed during home visits and some are collected from the Funda Nenja office. We still provide the education to the families during home visits in protecting children from abuse of different kinds and we promoted the gardening project for families to socialize while they working together to fight poverty.



**Office Visits** there have been 81 visits to the office since we started to have an office day where people come for counselling and social advice. Some of these people have visited our office through other people's advice, or after home visits have been done and they feel the need to get more assistance confidentially and some come voluntarily motivated by their personal experiences. The office days have provided support to vulnerable members of the community and aim for positive change. We have done 8 referrals for different issues of children and adults.

**Friday Lessons** these lessons are happening every second Friday of the month during the dog school programme, for the senior classes, and have provided resilience to children, understanding their strengths and the capabilities of others, and has raised awareness of emotions on issues they face. As living creatures, children learned about their rights, adult's rights and how they are interlinked with animal's rights and freedoms, as per the Funda Nenja mission. During these lessons children learn of their responsibilities towards their rights again relating their actions to respond to animal's needs.



**School lessons** we have provided 9 life skills lessons at Nxamalala Islamic and Sifisesihle Schools that were CAPS aligned and presented topics that help build confidence in children and the ability to deal with life changes and challenges. These lessons have encouraged children to know and understand when they are being bullied by peers and adults and taught them to be able to handle issues and problems they commonly encounter in their daily lives. These lessons raised awareness of resources that are available in the community.

**Workshops:** In this period, we have done 6 parenting workshops for parents and guardians and provided a safe and confidential space and time to debrief. During this time, we manage to do bereavement counselling, spoke of emotions, managing parent burnouts, teaching empathy and social skills for both children and parents.



**Holiday Clubs:** Most children are left alone at homes during holidays and Funda Nenja provided 4 educational life skills activities in each term for 82 children and raised awareness of children's rights, emotions, body development. We provided some art activities where children were able to express and embrace their talents.





**Support Groups:** We have 11 mothers who support each with their difficulties and meet 3 times a week sharing their life experiences, do gardening, hand work and provide feeding scheme activities to some children of Funda Nenja and from the community. Some of these women attend our parenting workshops.



**Food Parcels** There were 198 food parcels distributed to the Funda Nenja needy families and to the feeding scheme. These food parcels are instrumental in assisting many families with little or no income, many of whom need to take daily medication, which is often not possible if they do not have food to eat. Most of these food parcels consists of fresh vegetables and non-perishable groceries, as well as a bag of dog food if the family own a dog. Thanks to our many donors who make it possible for us to purchase these much needed food parcels.

## We have moved:

One of our biggest challenges last year was moving premises. In November 2023, we started moving our organisation to our new offices at the Mpophomeni Stadium, which is owned by the uMngeni Municipality. Like all moves, it was a little stressful, but our amazing team made the transition effortlessly. Prior to us moving in, we planted 84 small trees and shrubs on the property, which had recently been donated by a local nursery. We look forward to watching these trees grow over the coming years, which will hopefully provide some much needed shade for the dogs and children in our dog school.



## In Conclusion

All in all Funda Nenja has managed to continue servicing the Mpophomeni community in both animal and social welfare aspects, and we are extremely proud of what we have accomplished and blessed to have an amazing team of like-minded and dedicated people.

We are also enormously grateful to all our sponsors and donors as their support makes it possible for Funda Nenja to grow and to continue the valuable work that we do.

Our Facebook page is still very popular with just over 10,000 followers and just over 1,000 followers on Instagram. These numbers are increasing annually.
